In this international competition, children from some thirty countries throughout the world were asked to reflect on the fundamental connection that exists between people and nature.

Park View's fourth-grade Project Expand students researched legends, myths, rituals and customs that characterized the people of the five continents, and evoked earth, air, fire, water and weather. Once this work of exploration was completed, the students drew a mask representing the planet earth and wrote a short story in the form of a legend, which allowed the earth to speak for itself. The story reminded people of the fragile and limited resources of the earth, and the importance of respecting the natural balance between man and nature. The children allowed the Earth to tell its story through a masked character of their own invention.

It is with great pride that I announce that Park View School's entry was chosen to represent the United States in Paris, France. The opening of the "Tales Around the World" exhibition will take place on June 1, 2007 at the Quai Branly Museum. The event will be a major international meeting of the child winners from all the countries taking part in the program.
