RE: Incident of September 1, 2010

On September 1, 2010, at 0704 hours, we received a call for an unresponsive patient in the school bookstore at Glenbard East High School. Engine 44 and Medic 65 responded from Fire Station 2. While en route, there were reports of bystander C.P.R. being performed. Upon arrival of Medic 65 and Engine 44, the patient was conscious and breathing on his own. Patient did remember feeling dizzy and feeling like he was going to "pass out" prior to the incident.

Prior to the arrival of EMS units, a co-worker began C.P.R. and two students assisted by activating the 9-1-1 system and obtaining the nearest A.E.D. The teacher and fellow co-worker, Dan Hogan, was notified by Catherine Priebe that someone needed help. They then ran back to the bookstore where they all turned the unresponsive patient over. While "Coach" Hogan began C.P.R., Catherine ran for the nearest A.E.D. and D.J. Nack activated the 9-1-1 emergency response system. After approximately one minute of C.P.R., the patient resumed breathing on his own.

On this call, the two students and teacher involved, recognized and reacted to a life threatening situation. There is no question that their actions made a difference in whether our patient would live or die. For this, Dan Hogan, Catherine Priebe, and D.J. Nack should be recognized as outstanding citizens and neighbors in our community.
